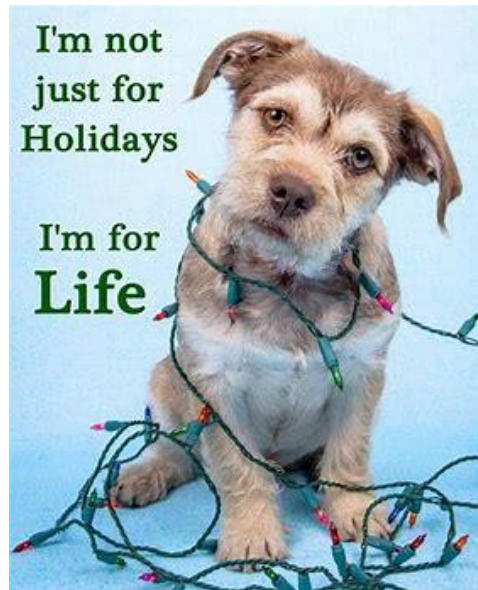

There are many reasons *not* to adopt a companion pet as a Christmas present, such as1) *Giftng a family member or friend with a 10- to 20-year commitment to a live animal is not something one should do on impulse.* 2) *If you subtract Christmas week from the rest of the year, you still have 358 days to bring a new furry loved one into your home and heart.* 3) *Chances are if you visit your local shelter in late January or February, you'll have your pick of pets who've already worn out their welcome as Christmas gifts. It happens every single year.*

Of course, we would love to have all of our adoptable animals in loving homes for the new year. My fact-finding in the above paragraph should not deter you from finding that perfect companion pet. However, we do ask that you do your research *before* adopting a rescue pet. 1) *Try to find the animal that fits your lifestyle – i.e if you can't exercise your dog, don't adopt a Border Collie.* 2) *Realize that rescue animals sometimes come with past baggage – you will need to be patient and give your pet the time to adjust to its new home.* 3) *This is a LIFETIME commitment – your new pet is a member of your family, not a disposable one.* 4) *Perhaps think about adopting an adult or senior dog instead of a puppy – most adult dogs come already houstrained and require much less work than a puppy during the busy holiday season.*

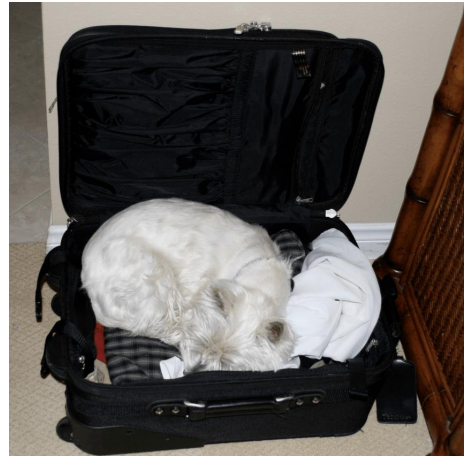
Cozy sofa bed – not for large breeds

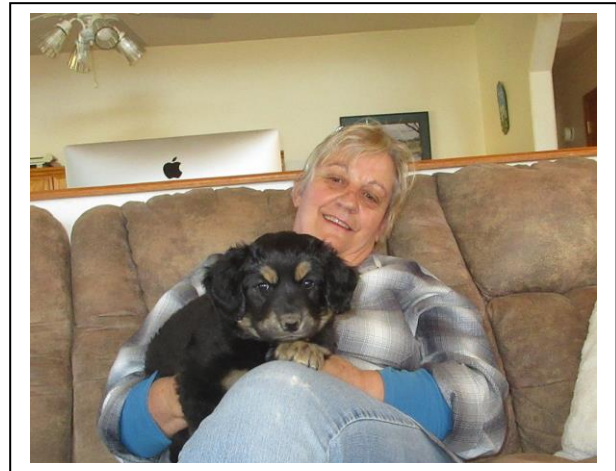
Puppies . . . Puppies . . . Puppies

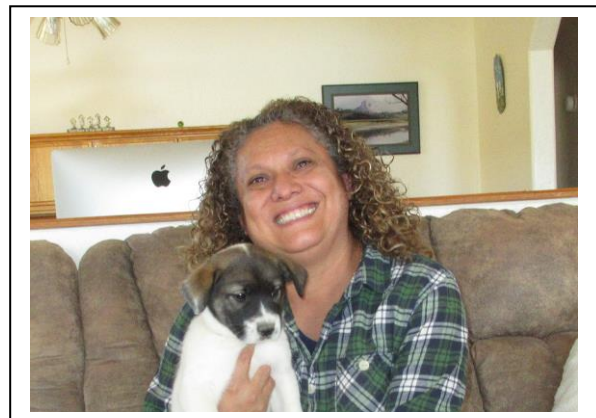

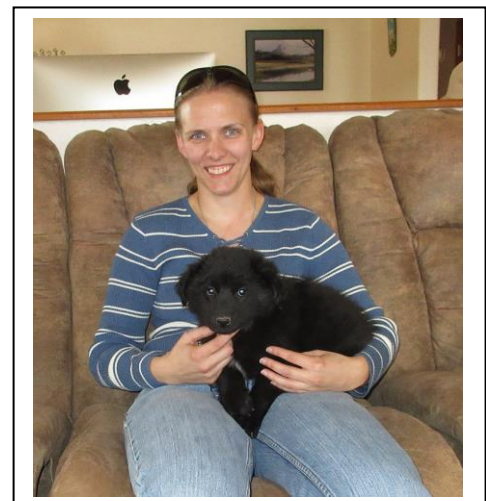

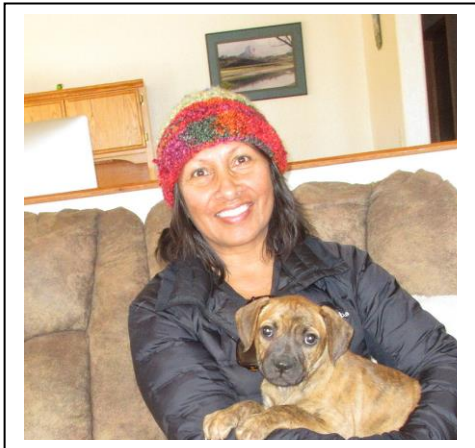
← one tired puppy waiting for the last flight home – so cute !

The last puppy adoptions. . . .

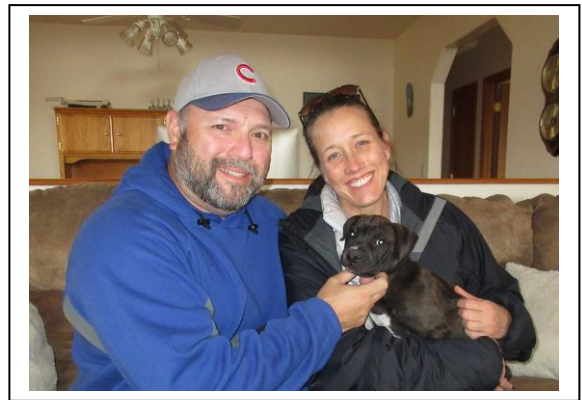

One pup needed extra attention

Carol, our foster mom, named her “Tink.” From the very beginning in late September, Tink was smaller than her siblings and not gaining weight. She seemed to have trouble eating. She was checked for a cleft palette, but that test was negative. Carol decided to feed her by putting a tube down her throat, which worked for a while but not always – at this point, little Tink only weighed 1.5 lbs.

Carol made some changes in the feeding process – tube feeding was set aside because it was not working. Instead, she tried putting yogurt in a syringe – Tink loved it! It was a lot of work for Carol to make sure this little girl was fed on a regular basis, but by October 3, Tink had hit the 2 lb. mark! Considering that her siblings were already close to 4 lbs., Tink had a ways to catch up. Weight gain continued, and soon Tink was able to eat gruel (Carol’s concoction of mushy puppy food). By Oct. 11, she weighed in at 2 lb. 11 oz. and we were told she had a “junkyard dog attitude” – in other words, even tho Tink was the runt, she didn’t take any guff from her brothers & sisters.



← Here’s a photo of Tink enjoying her gruel. Things continued on a pretty even keel for Tink during the following week; however, Carol had a “gut feeling” that something was still not right with this tiny pup. On Oct. 11, it was necessary to make another trip to the vet as Tink was not eating again. She was placed on antibiotics and probiotics, as most of her issues appeared to be gastric. At this point, Tink was struggling. She had lost 20% of her body weight in 3 days. In addition to her meds, she was being given B12 shots, but it didn’t look good

for this little girl. By now, Carol had moved Tink into her bedroom so she could monitor her more closely. Tink loved sleeping with Carol’s bedroom slipper, and, of course, being held by Carol. ↓

In the next few weeks, Tink was the focus of Carol’s attention as she was required to give her 3 meds 2x/day plus the B12 shot, in addition to providing numerous syringe feedings. Tink would have good days (where she would eat and start bouncing around like a normal puppy) but also have bad days (she would vomit and have seizures). She could not afford to lose more weight. Carol’s love and persistence paid off, because Tink started to gain weight again and by the end of October, she was actually up to 4 lbs.



Then, bad news hit once more. At the end of October, Tink was having difficulty eating again – it was hard to find anything she was willing to eat. Since Tink was now old enough and big enough to endure more tests, Doc Vincent decided to insert dye into her digestive system and take hourly x-rays to determine her health issue. Doc Vincent found that her stomach wasn’t emptying properly and surgery would be required. On October 30, surgery was performed – that was the answer! After that, Tink could eat with no issues in her digestive tract. She has gained weight steadily and looks and acts like a puppy should.

Just look at this photo of Carol and Tink – it was worth all the time, feedings and administering meds, sleepless nights, and worrying about one sick puppy. We are happy to announce that Carol has officially adopted little “Tink” – who is not quite so little anymore. As of this writing, Tink weighed in at 10 lbs. !!

Congratulations, Carol, on your new family member!



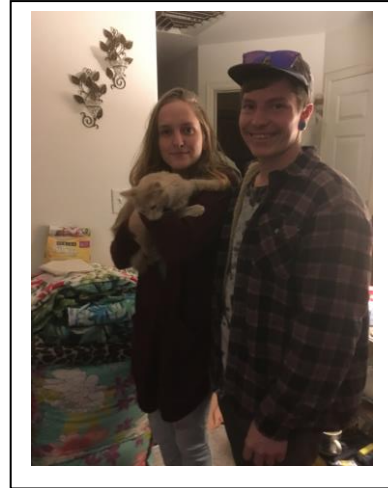
Welcome to kitty corner

All of these kittens were adopted in October and November from our foster mom, Quincy, who lives in Delta, Colorado. Way to go, Quincy!

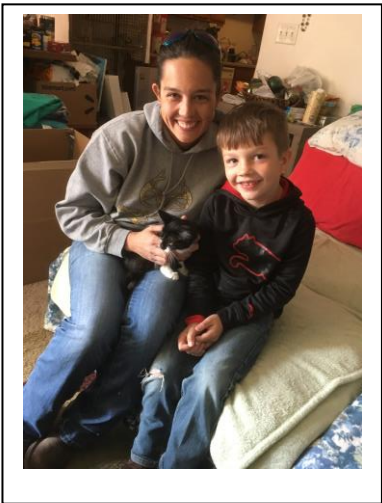

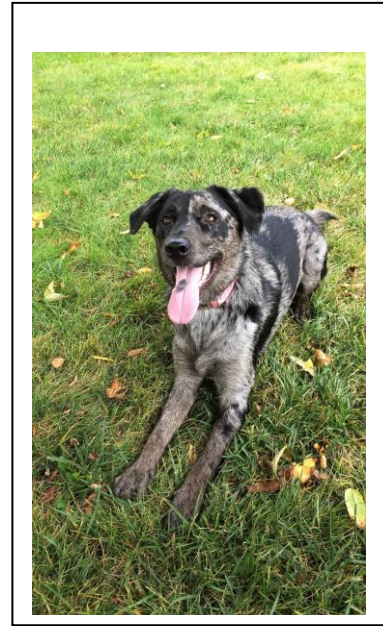

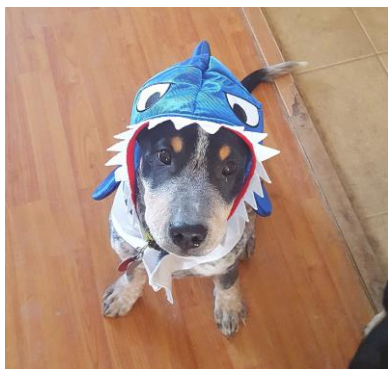
